Said board or officials shall execute said contracts in accordance with law, the charter and ordinances of the City of Cincinnati.

That this ordinance shall be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and general welfare and shall, subject to the terms of Article II, Section 6 of the Charter, be effective immediately, but in no event later than July 1, 2015. The reason for the emergency is the immediate need to provide for the current operating expenses of the City of Cincinnati.

WHEREAS, it is necessary, that Council approve the expenditure of funds in existence or in collection from certain capital improvements; and

WHEREAS, it is advisable, in order to present a comprehensive program to authorize the allocation and appropriation to certain capital improvements of funds to be raised by the issuance of bonds of the City of Cincinnati and from the proceeds of the Cincinnati Southern Railway; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That there is adopted and approved as the Capital Improvement Program and Budget for the fiscal year 2016, the projects listed below in Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 to be financed in the amounts and from the sources set forth therein.

Section 2. That the sum of \$750,000 is hereby transferred and returned to source Fund 758 from capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x152344, "Convention Center Expansion," for the purpose of closing out or decreasing the existing capital improvement program project account and providing resources for the FY 2016 Capital Improvement Program.

Section 3. That the sum of \$779,200.00 existing in various funds is appropriated and allocated, reprogramming projects according to Schedule A attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, for the improvements listed in Schedule A.

Section 4. That the sum of \$14,103,000.00 from the 0.15% income tax is hereby appropriated and allocated to the individual project accounts listed in Schedule B attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, for the improvements listed in

Schedule B.

Section 5. That the sum of \$20,613,000.00 from the Cincinnati Southern Railway rollover, notes and investment earnings is appropriated and allocated according to Schedule C attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, for the improvements listed in Schedule C.

Section 6. That the sum of \$15,000,000.00 to be raised by the issuance of bonds by the City of Cincinnati is appropriated and allocated according to Schedule D attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, for the improvements listed in Schedule D.

Section 7. That the sum of \$6,000,000.00 from the Income Tax Supported Debt is appropriated and allocated according to Schedule E attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, for the improvements listed in Schedule E.

Section 8. That the sum of \$14,600,000.00 to be raised by the issuance of bonds by the City of Cincinnati as well as the sum of \$6,500,000.00 from the 0.15% income tax is hereby appropriated and allocated to the individual project accounts listed in Schedule F attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, for the improvements listed in Schedule F, in accordance with the capital acceleration plan.

Section 9. That the BLOC Ministries capital improvement program project is hereby declared to serve a public purpose because the project will foster local improvements and investment, increase neighborhood vitality, and have an estimated life or period of usefulness of five years or more.

Section 10. That no expenditure of money from project accounts shall be made nor shall expenditures thereof be contracted for unless the money therefore has been received by the City or is in the process of collection.

Section 11. That the Finance Director of the City is authorized to draw his warrant upon the Treasury of the City for the amounts appropriated and for the purposes stated in this ordinance, upon receiving the proper certificates and vouchers therefore approved by the board, the City Manager, or official designated by him, or other officers authorized by law to approve

the same, or authorized by an ordinance or resolution of Council to make the expenditures; provided, that vouchers for payment out of any of the foregoing appropriations by order of a court decree shall be approved by the City Solicitor in addition to any other authority required by law.

Section 12. That Council does hereby authorize the proper board or officials to enter into any contract or contracts for any or all of the projects or parts thereof as set forth in Section 1 hereof. Said board or official shall execute said contracts in accordance with law, the charter and ordinances of the City of Cincinnati.

Section 13. That appropriations and allocations to the various projects remaining unexpended at the end of the fiscal year 2016 shall remain in the individual project accounts and may be expended at a later time, provided however, money not required in a particular project account, as determined by City Council, shall be returned by the Finance Director to the fund from which it was originally transferred.

Section 14. That nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as intending to supersede or dispense with the procedures or acts required by state or federal laws or regulations relating to matters involving assessments or state or federal assistance projects.

Section 15. That this ordinance shall be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety and general welfare and shall, subject to the terms of Article II, Section 6 of the Charter, be effective immediately but in no event later than July 1, 2015. The reason for the emergency is the need to have funding immediately in place in order to carry out the City's Capital Improvement Program.

Each water supply service shall be subject to a service charge. The service charge shall be based on the size of the water meter.

This section shall apply to each water meter used, but shall not apply to water supply services subject to Section 401-81 or Section 401-82.

Monthly billed charges payable after 30 calendar days and quarterly billed charges payable after 91 calendar days following the effective date shall be calculated entirely at the amended rates.

Section 6. That the proper City officials are authorized to carry out the terms of this ordinance.

WHEREAS, Artworks has created and developed a plan for art displays, to be fabricated of standalone 3D block lettering, vinyl on windows, vinyl on walls, light projected onto vinyl on walls, or light projected onto the ground, and Artworks has proposed locations for the art pieces throughout downtown, the Banks, and Over-the-Rhine; and

WHEREAS, approximately thirty-eight of the art pieces consist of five-by-seven foot vinyl displays that include creatively written excerpts from a poem about Cincinnati, entitled "Seven Hills and A Queen to Name Them," paired with or incorporated into other interesting visuals; and

WHEREAS, approximately twelve larger pieces are made of vinyl, light projected onto vinyl panels, or light projected onto the ground, displaying phrases that are excerpts from the same poem, and the lettering is large enough to be immediately visible on the exterior of each building; and

WHEREAS, one art piece consists of standalone 3D letters forming the phrase "Sing the Queen City," a line from the end of the poem, to be placed on the ground in the green area in front of the Freedom Center at the Banks; and

WHEREAS, included in or adjacent to each art piece will also be a symbol of the Artworks project, "#InkYourLove," pursuant to which all of the art was created, and the seal of the City of Cincinnati and the logos of the sponsoring organizations; and

WHEREAS, Artworks has offered to donate all of the art pieces to the City to be displayed from roughly mid-June to early November; and

WHEREAS, Artworks has coordinated with and obtained permission from the owners of all property upon which art displays are proposed to be installed or projected, including right-of-entry permission for all public property locations, and none of the public property locations include the right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, at its regularly scheduled meeting on June 5, 2015, the City Planning Commission reviewed and approved the proposed locations for the art pieces, as required by Article VII, Section 4, of the Charter; and

WHEREAS, acceptance of the proposed gift is in accordance with "Compete Goal 3: Become nationally and internationally recognized as a vibrant and unique city" as described on page 121 and with "Live Goal 1: Build a robust public life" as described on page 149 of Plan Cincinnati (2012); and

WHEREAS, the approximate value of the art displays is \$413,000, and the donation will enable the City to cultivate a unique and creative atmosphere for residents and visitors to enjoy throughout the summer and early fall of 2015; and

WHEREAS, Council considers acceptance of the donation of the proposed art from Artworks to be in the best interest of the City; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That the City of Cincinnati hereby accepts the generous donation of art displays worth approximately \$413,000 from Artworks, to be placed at locations throughout downtown, the Banks, and Over-the-Rhine.

Section 2. That the City Manager is hereby authorized to accept said gift on behalf of the City of Cincinnati.

Section 3. That the City Manager shall oversee, manage, and direct the installation, maintenance, and removal of

all art displays donated in connection this ordinance, which installation, maintenance, and removal shall be carried out in cooperation with Artworks.

Section 4. That the proper City officials are hereby authorized to do all things necessary and proper to carry out the provisions of Sections 1 through 3 hereof.

Section 5. MODIFYING the provisions of Chapter 701, "Animals, Birds, Fowl," of Title VII, "General Regulations," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by amending Sections 701-1-D-1, "Dangerous Dog," 701-2, "Leash Required; Responsibility for Injury," 701-14, "Seizure and Impoundment of Dog," 701-23, "Abusing Dog; Dog Fighting," 701-50, "Nuisance, Dangerous, and Vicious Dogs," and 701-99, "Penalties," 701-99-J, "Impoundment Fees"; **REPEALING** Sections 701-1-C-1, "Competent Adult," 701-14A, "Administrative Hearing Regarding Impoundment," and 701-14B, "Notice of Impoundment and Hearing"; and **ORDAINING** new Section 701-14-B, "Impoundment; Administrative Hearing, Expenses, Obtaining Release"; and further **MODIFYING** the provisions of Title XV, "Code Compliance And Hearings," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code by amending Sections 1501-3, "Class A Civil Offenses," 1501-5, "Class B Civil Offenses," 1501-7, "Class C Civil Offenses," 1501-11, "Class E Civil Offenses," 1501-16, "Class E2 Civil Offenses."

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That Sections 701-1-D-1, "Dangerous Dog," 701-2, "Leash Required; Responsibility for Injury," 701-14, "Seizure and Impoundment of Dog," 701-23, "Abusing Dog; Dog Fighting," 701-50, "Nuisance, Dangerous, and Vicious Dogs," 701-99, "Penalties," and 701-99-J, "Impoundment Fees," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 701-1-D-1. - Dangerous Dog.

(A) "Dangerous dog" means a dog that, without provocation, has done any of the following:

- (1) Caused injury, other than killing or serious injury, to any person;
- (2) Killed or caused serious injury to another dog; or
- (3) Been the subject of a third or subsequent violation of either Section 701-2(A) of this chapter or section 955.22(C) of the Ohio Revised Code.

(B) "Dangerous dog" does not include a police dog that has caused injury, other than killing or serious injury, to any person or has caused serious injury or killed another dog while the police dog is being used to assist one or more law enforcement officers in the performance of their official duties.

Sec. 701-2. - Leash Required; Responsibility for Injury.

(A) Except when a dog is lawfully engaged in a competition or hunting and accompanied by the owner, keeper, harbinger, or handler of the dog, no owner, keeper, or harbinger of any dog shall fail at any time to do either of the following:

- (1) Keep the dog physically confined or restrained upon the premises of the owner, keeper, or harbinger by a leash, tether, adequate fence, supervision, or secure enclosure to prevent escape;

(2) When off the premises of the owner, keeper, or harbinger, ~~Keep~~ the dog on a leash under the reasonable control of some person who is of suitable age and discretion;

(3) This subsection does not apply when the dog is within a designated dog park pursuant to Rule 41 of the Board of Park Commissioners of the City of Cincinnati.

(B) *Civil Penalties Violations.*

(1) *Off Leash.* A violation of subsection 701-2(A) shall constitute a Class A Civil Offense.

(2) *Menacing Fashion.* A violation of subsection 701-2(A) which results in the dog behaving in a menacing fashion shall constitute a Class C Civil Offense. A dog which has behaved in a menacing fashion may meet the definition of a nuisance dog under section 701-1-N and may be designated as a nuisance dog in accordance with section 701-50 of this chapter.

(3) *Injury.* A violation of subsection 701-2(A) which results in injury to any person or domestic animal shall constitute a Class C Civil Offense. A dog which has caused injury to any person or domestic animal may meet the definition of a dangerous dog under section 701-1-D-1 and may be designated as a dangerous dog in accordance with section 701-50 of this chapter.

(4) *Serious Injury.* A violation of subsection 701-2(A) which results in serious injury to any person or domestic animal shall constitute a Class E2 Civil Offense. Subsequent violations of subsection 701-2(B) which result in serious injury to any person or domestic animal shall constitute a Class F Civil Offense. A dog which has

~~caused serious injury to any person or domestic animal may meet the definition of a vicious dog under section 701-1-V and may be designated as a vicious dog in accordance with section 701-50 of this chapter.~~

~~(C) — Educational — Training, Sterilization. In the event that a person is held liable for the civil penalties enumerated in subsections (B)(2), (B)(3), or (B)(4) of this section or section 701-23 of this chapter or the police department determines a dog is a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog pursuant to section 701-60 of this chapter, that person shall, at that person's sole expense:~~

~~(1) Take an educational training course provided by a local humane society or, with approval of the city manager, a similar course provided by another entity, which teaches the basic tenets of responsible dog ownership; and~~

~~(2) Spay or neuter the dog.~~

Sec. 701-14-A. - Seizure and Impoundment of Dogs.

~~(A) A police officer shall cause to be removed from the premises any dog which the police officer deems to be a dangerous dog as defined by section 701-1-D-1 or a vicious dog as defined by section 701-1-V which is not properly confined in accordance with section 701-50~~

~~(B) The police officer who removes a dog pursuant to this section shall file the appropriate complaint in municipal court within 14 days of the seizure of the dog, and shall hold the dog until final adjudication of the charge, unless the police officer is ordered to release the dog to its owner, harbinger, or keeper as a result of an administrative hearing pursuant to CMC 701-14A~~

~~(A) A police officer may cause any dog to be seized and impounded, at the owner's expense, if:~~

~~(1) The dog's owner, keeper, or harbinger violates section 701-2 of this chapter; or~~

~~(2) The police officer deems the dog to be a nuisance dog, a dangerous dog, or a vicious dog, as defined in sections 701-1-N, 701-1-D-1, and 701-1-V of this chapter; or~~

~~(3) The dog is a victim of abuse or has been used for dog fighting in violation of section 701-23 of this chapter.~~

~~(B) Within three days of the seizure of the dog and/or identification of the dog's owner, keeper or harbinger, whichever is later, the police officer who causes a dog to be impounded pursuant to this section shall either:~~

~~(1) File the appropriate complaint in municipal court for a criminal charge under section 701-23 of this chapter; or~~

~~(2) Forward the appropriate citation to the Office of Administrative Hearings for a civil violation under this chapter.~~

~~(C) The police officer who causes a dog to be impounded pursuant to this section shall cause the dog to be held until final adjudication of the charge or civil violation, unless ordered to release the dog as a result of an administrative hearing under section 701-14-2 of this chapter.~~

Sec. 701-23. - Abusing Dogs; Dog Fighting.

~~No person shall beat, abuse or injure any dog in an immoderate, cruel or unnecessary manner; and no person shall open or keep a dog pen or dog pit for the purpose of causing or permitting dogs to fight; and no person shall to cause, or set, or permit dogs to fight. A violation of this section shall constitute a first degree misdemeanor or a Class E1 Civil Offense.~~

Sec. 701-50. - Nuisance, Dangerous, and Vicious Dogs.

~~(A) Designation as Nuisance, Dangerous, or Vicious.~~

~~(1) If a police officer has reasonable cause to believe that a dog in the person's jurisdiction is a nuisance dog, dangerous dog, or vicious dog, the police officer shall notify the owner, keeper, or harbinger of that dog, within three days after that person is identified, by certified mail or in person, of both of the following:~~

~~(i) That the police officer has designated the dog a nuisance dog, dangerous dog, or vicious dog, as applicable;~~

~~(ii) That the owner, keeper, or harbinger of the dog may attend request a hearing regarding the designation in accordance with this section, section 701-14-1, and section 701-14-2, which hearing will take place no less than seven days from mailing of the notice or personal service of notice. The notice shall include instructions for filing a request for a hearing in the city in which the dog's owner, keeper, or harbinger resides.~~

~~(2) In cases in which there is no criminal violation charged under section 701-23 of this chapter, the Office of Administrative Hearings shall make the final determination regarding a dog's designation as a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog. At the hearing, the city has the burden of proving, by clear and convincing evidence, that the dog is a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog. If the owner, keeper, or harbinger of the dog disagrees with the designation of the dog as a nuisance dog, dangerous dog, or vicious dog, as applicable, the owner,~~

~~keeper, or harborer, not later than ten days after receiving notification of the designation, may request a hearing regarding the determination. The request for a hearing shall be in writing and shall be filed with the municipal court or county court that has territorial jurisdiction over the residence of the dog's owner, keeper, or harborer. At the hearing, the person who designated the dog as a nuisance dog, dangerous dog, or vicious dog has the burden of proving, by clear and convincing evidence, that the dog is a nuisance dog, dangerous dog, or vicious dog.~~

(3) The owner, keeper, or harborer of the dog or the person officer who designated the dog as a nuisance dog, dangerous dog, or vicious dog may appeal the court's final determination of the Office of Administrative Hearings as in any other case filed in that court heard by that office.

(B) Duty of Care of Owner After Designation of a Dog as Nuisance, Dangerous, or Vicious as Provided in Section 701-50(A).

~~(1)~~ Except when a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog is lawfully engaged in hunting or training for the purpose of hunting and is accompanied by the owner, keeper, harborer, or handler of the dog, no owner, keeper, or harborer of a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog shall fail to do any of the following:

(1)(i) While that dog is on the premises of the owner, keeper, or harborer, the dog shall be securely confined it at all times in a locked pen that has a top, locked fenced yard, or other locked enclosure that has a top, except that if the dog is a nuisance dog it may also be confined in a locked fenced yard without a top, and:

(i)(ii) No nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog shall be tethered or otherwise tied to any inanimate object, such as a tree, post, or building, outside of its enclosure as provided herein.

(ii)(iii) Owners, keepers, or harborers, of nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dogs who maintain the animal outdoors, shall have a portion of their property fenced with a perimeter or area fence. The pen or kennel may not share common fencing with the area or perimeter fence.

(2)(iv) All owners, keepers, or harborers of any nuisance dog, vicious dog, dangerous dog, or any dog which is used to guard any property, shall display in a prominent place on their premises and at each entrance and exit to the area where such dog is confined, a sign easily readable to the public using the words "Beware of Dog."

(3)(2) While the nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog is off the premises of the owner, keeper, or harborer, that person shall keep that dog on a tether that is not more than six feet in length and additionally shall do at least one of the following:

(i) Keep that dog in a locked pen that has a top, locked fenced yard, or other locked enclosure that has a top;

(ii) Have the leash or tether controlled by a person who is of suitable age and discretion or securely attach, tie, or affix the leash or tether to the ground or a stationary object or fixture so that the dog is adequately restrained and station such a person in close

enough proximity to that dog so as to prevent it from causing injury to any person; or

(iii) Muzzle that dog by sufficient means to prevent its from biting other persons or animals.

(4) Educational Training; Sterilization. Within 31 days of a dog's final designation as a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog, the dog's owner, keeper, or harborer, shall, at that person's sole expense:

(i) Take an educational training course provided by a local humane society or, with approval of the Office of Administrative Hearings, a similar course provided by another entity, which teaches the basic tenets of responsible dog ownership; and

(ii) Spay or neuter the dog.

(C) Additional Duty of Care – Dangerous or Vicious Dogs.

(1) No person who has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to three or more violations of Ohio Revised Code Sections 955.10, 955.22, or 955.25, or who has violated Section 701-2 of this chapter three or more times involving the same dog and/or no owner, keeper, or harborer of a dangerous or vicious dog shall fail to do the following:

(i) Obtain liability insurance in an amount not less than \$100,000.00 with an insurer authorized to write liability insurance in this state providing coverage in each occurrence because of damage or bodily injury to or death of a person caused by the dangerous dog if so ordered by a court and provide proof

of that liability insurance upon request to any law enforcement officer, county dog warden, or public health official charged with enforcing this section;

(ii) Obtain a dangerous dog registration certificate from the county auditor pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 955.22, affix a tag that identifies the dog as a dangerous or vicious dog to the dog's collar, and ensure that the dog wears the collar and tag at all times;

(iii) Notify the local dog warden immediately if any of the following occurs:

a) The dog is loose or unconfined.

b) The dog bites a person, unless the dog is on the property of the owner of the dog, and the person who is bitten is unlawfully trespassing or committing a criminal act within the boundaries of that property.

c) The dog attacks another animal while the dog is off the property of the owner of the dog.

(iv) If the dog is sold, given to another person, or dies, notify the county auditor within ten days of the sale, transfer, or death.

(v) While that dog is on the premises of the owner, keeper, or harborer, the dog shall be securely confined it at all times in a locked pen that has a top or other locked enclosure

that has a top., and:

(2) It shall be unlawful for any person to own, harbor, or keep more than one dangerous or vicious dog.

(3) The owner of a dangerous or vicious dog shall present the dangerous dog registration certificate upon being requested to do so by any law enforcement officer, dog warden, or public health official charged with enforcing this section.

(D) Penalties.

(1) Whoever violates subsection (E) is subject to a Class E civil penalty.

(2) Whoever violates subsection (B) is subject to a Class E civil penalty.

(3) Additionally, for violations of subsections (B) or (C), the administrative hearing officer may order the offender to personally supervise the dog that the offender owns, keeps, or harbors, to cause that dog to complete dog obedience training, or to do both. The administrative hearing officer, in the alternative, may order the dog to be humanely destroyed by a licensed veterinarian, the county dog warden, or the county humane society at the owner's expense.

Sec. 701-99. - Penalties.

Whoever violates section 701-23 shall be guilty of a first degree misdemeanor or in violation of a Class E1 Civil Offense. Any vicious dog which attacks a human being or domestic animal may be ordered destroyed when, in the court's judgment or the judgment of the Office of Administrative Hearings, such vicious dog represents a continuing threat of serious harm to human beings or domestic animals.

Sec. 701-99-J. - Impoundment Fees.

In addition to any penalty that is provided pursuant to Chapter 955 of the Ohio Revised Code or Chapter 701 of the Cincinnati Municipal Code, when the Cincinnati Police Department has caused a dog has been to be confiscated by the Cincinnati Police Department, due to a violation of the Cincinnati Municipal Code or the Ohio Revised Code, the owner shall reimburse the City for all costs resulting from the impoundment fees charged by the SPCA of the dog, including, but not limited to, all costs and fees associated with the dog's impoundment and medical and/or veterinary care.

~~The owner shall reimburse the City regardless of the outcome of any criminal charge. The City shall be paid prior to the release of the dog from the SPCA. Upon written request of the dog owner, the fee may be reviewed and/or waived if the owner was acquitted of the charge.~~

Section 2. That existing Sections 701-1-C-1, "Competent Adult," 701-1-D-1, "Dangerous Dog," 701-2, "Leash Required; Responsibility for Injury," 701-14, "Seizure and Impoundment of Dog," 701-14A, "Administrative Hearing Regarding Impoundment," 701-14B, "Notice of Impoundment and Hearing," 701-23, "Abusing Dog; Dog Fighting," 701-50, "Nuisance, Dangerous, and Vicious Dogs," 701-99, "Penalties," and 701-99-J, "Impoundment Fees," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are hereby repealed.

Section 3. That new Section 701-14-2, "Impoundment; Administrative Hearing, Expenses, Obtaining Release," of Chapter 701, "Animals, Birds, Fowl," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code shall be enacted to read as follows:

Sec. 701-14-B. - Impoundment; Administrative Hearing, Expenses, Obtaining Release.

(A) Notice

(1) As soon as practicable,

but no later than three days after the impoundment of any dog under this chapter and/or identification of the dog's owner, whichever is later, the impounding police officer shall provide written notice to the owner of the dog in accordance with CMC §1501-13.

(2) Such notice shall include:

(i) That the dog has been taken into custody;

(ii) The location where the dog is being held;

(iii) The reason for impoundment;

(iv) The expenses of impoundment and boarding and that the owner will be responsible for those expenses;

(v) That the dog's owner, keeper or harborer, can challenge the validity of the impoundment at a hearing before the Hearing Examiner; and

(vi) The date and location of any scheduled hearing.

(3) Such notice shall also reference this section so that the owner is made aware of the relevant procedures in the context of impoundment of the dog.

(B) Office of Administrative Hearings

(1) A police officer's initial determination that a dog is a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog will not become permanent until after a hearing at the Office of Administrative Hearings in accordance with CMC §701-50.

(i) All interested persons shall have the opportunity to present evidence on the

issue of whether the dog should be designated as a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog.

(ii) Failure of the dog's owner, keeper, or harborer to appear at the hearing shall be considered prima facie evidence that the dog is a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog and shall result in the forfeiture of the dog to the City of Cincinnati.

(2) When a police officer issues a citation for violation of a civil offense under this chapter, a hearing shall take place in the Office of Administrative Hearings in accordance with CMC §1501-17.

(3) The owner shall be responsible for any expenses incurred for the holding of the dog during the pendency of a hearing.

(4) The hearing shall be held within seven days of notice being served to the owner, keeper, or harborer of the dog in accordance with CMC §1501-13.

(5) Failure of the owner, keeper, or harborer to attend any scheduled administrative hearings will result in the forfeiture of the dog to the City of Cincinnati.

(C) Impoundment Pursuant to Criminal Charges Under CMC §701-23

(1) When a dog is impounded pursuant to a charge or civil citation against its owner under CMC §701-23, the owner shall be responsible for any expenses incurred for the holding of a dog until final adjudication of the charge.

(2) Failure of the owner, keeper, or harborer to attend all scheduled criminal court appearances will result in forfeiture of the dog to the

City of Cincinnati.

(3) If the owner, keeper, or harborer is found guilty of a criminal offense or in violation of a civil offense under CMC §701-23, the dog will be forfeited to the City of Cincinnati.

(D) Obtaining Release of an Impounded Dog

(1) If the owner, keeper, or harborer is found to be in violation of any civil offense under this chapter, or if the dog is found to be a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog, the owner must obtain release of the dog within 31 days after the final order of the administrative hearing officer.

(2) If the dog is a dangerous dog or a vicious dog, the owner must show proof of liability insurance, in accordance with CMC §701-50(C), in order to obtain release of the dog.

(3) The owner must pay all costs resulting from the impoundment of the dog including, but not limited to, all costs and fees associated with the dog's impoundment and medical and/or veterinary care, in order to obtain release of the dog.

(4) The dog shall be released to the owner without expense only if:

(i) The owner, keeper, or harborer is found not to be in violation of any civil offense under this chapter, citation for which led to the impoundment of the dog;

(ii) The dog is found not to be a nuisance, dangerous, or vicious dog, when an initial designation as such led to the impoundment of the dog;

(iii) The owner, keeper, or

harborer is found to be not guilty of an offense, criminal or civil, under CMC §701-23, when a charge under that section led to the impoundment of the dog; and

(iv) The owner, keeper, or harborer obtains release of the dog within 3 days of the final hearing date or final adjudication in court.

(5) The owner, keeper, or harborer may voluntarily forfeit the dog to the City of Cincinnati by execution of a written consent form. The owner, keeper, or harborer shall still be responsible for any expenses incurred for the holding of the dog during the pendency of the hearing, including, but not limited to, all costs and fees associated with the dog's impoundment and medical and/or veterinary care.

Section 4. That existing Sections 1501-3, "Class A Civil Offenses," 1501-5, "Class B Civil Offenses," 1501-7, "Class C Civil Offenses," 1501-11, "Class E Civil Offenses," 1501-16, "Class E2 Civil Offenses," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are hereby modified to read as follows:

Sec. 1501-3. - Class A Civil Offenses.

A person who violates a standard of conduct set forth in a section or chapter of the Cincinnati Municipal Code listed below is liable for the civil fine specified in § 1501-99 for a Class A Civil Offense. If a person has previously been found to have violated the same provision of the Cincinnati Municipal Code within one year, that person may be charged as a second offender and on being found to have committed a second or subsequent offense is liable for the civil fine specified in § 1501-99 for the first violation of a Class B Civil Offense.

ORDINANCE NO. 184-2015

EXTENDING Interim Development Control District No. 77, "University Impact District," in the CUF neighborhood, as an interim development control district for a period of nine months pursuant to Chapter 1431, "Interim Development Control Overlay Districts," of the Cincinnati Zoning Code.

WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission and the Department of City Planning and Buildings are conducting a study to ensure that future development in the University Impact District maintains the existing density and character of the neighborhood and maintains health and safety standards; and

WHEREAS, the study includes consideration of zoning text amendments and zoning map amendments that may substantially affect permitted uses in the study area; and

WHEREAS, on April 22, 2015, the Council established Interim Development Control District No. 77, "University Impact District" ("IDC District No. 77"), for a period of three months in order to protect the area while the City Planning Commission and the Department of City Planning and Buildings conduct their study; and

WHEREAS, IDC District No. 77 expires on July 21, 2015; and

WHEREAS, as required by Cincinnati Municipal Code Section 1431-09, notice of the establishment of IDC District No. 77 and the time and place of a public hearing before the City Planning Commission to consider its extension was provided; and

WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission, at its regularly scheduled meeting on May 15, 2015, considered and recommended the extension of IDC District No. 77 for a period of nine months; and

WHEREAS, as required by Cincinnati Municipal Code Section 111-1 and Section 1431-11, notice of a public hearing before a committee of Council concerning the extension of IDC District No. 77 was provided; and

WHEREAS, the committee of the Council held a public hearing on the proposed extension of IDC District No. 77 and approved the extension, finding it to be in the best interests of the city and the general public's health, safety, and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the Council finds that extension of IDC District No. 77 is consistent with the Clifton Heights/UC Joint Urban Renewal Plan (2001), which seeks to knit together the University of Cincinnati and the residential community into something even

more significant – “an identifiable uptown business neighborhood of memorable spirit and urbanity” (p. 3); and

WHEREAS, the Council finds that extension of IDC District No. 77 is consistent with Plan Cincinnati (2012), particularly with Goal 3 in the Live Initiative Area to “provide a full spectrum of housing options and improve housing quality and affordability” as described on p. 164 and the Strategy under Goal 2 in the Live Initiative Area to “support and stabilize our neighborhoods” as described on p. 160; and

WHEREAS, the Council considers the extension of IDC District No. 77 to be in the best interests of the city and the general public’s health, safety, and welfare; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That Council makes the following findings:

(a) At its regularly scheduled meeting on May 15, 2015, the City Planning Commission recommended that the Council extend Interim Development Control District No. 77, “University Impact District” (“IDC District No. 77”), for a period of nine months while the City Planning Commission and the Department of City Planning and Buildings continue their study to ensure future development in the University Impact District maintains the existing density and character of the neighborhood and maintains health and safety standards, which study includes the consideration of zoning map amendments and zoning text amendments.

(b) The City Planning Commission and the Department of City Planning and Buildings have not completed their study as it will require significant community engagement and coordination across multiple City departments, but the study may reasonably be expected to be completed within one year and the zoning map amendments and zoning text

amendments that are the subject of the study may reasonably be enacted within one year.

(c) There is a prospect of change in use, construction of new structures, or alteration or demolition of existing structures in the University Impact District that would be inconsistent with zoning map amendments or zoning text amendments under consideration by the City Planning Commission and the Department of City Planning and Buildings, which amendments concern population densities, housing conditions, parking, traffic, and quality of life concerns.

Section 2. That pursuant to Cincinnati Municipal Code Section 1431-11, IDC District No. 77 shall remain in effect for an additional period of nine months, up to and including April 21, 2016.

Section 3. That IDC District No. 77, as depicted on the map attached as “Exhibit A” to Ordinance No. 91-2015, which is incorporated herein by reference, is extended throughout the area designated on the map as the interim development control district.

Section 4. That, pursuant to Cincinnati Municipal Code Section 1431-07, Section 1431-15, and Ordinance No. 91-2015, the Council adopted Application Review Guidelines for IDC District No. 77. The Application Review Guidelines, attached as “Exhibit B” to Ordinance No. 91-2015 and incorporated herein by reference, shall remain in effect for the duration of IDC District No. 77 and be used by the City Planning Commission in its review of applications for the use of property within IDC District No. 77.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 185-2015

AMENDING the provisions of Title V, “Traffic Code,” of the Cincinnati Municipal

Code by amending Sections 509-1, “Parking Meters, Locations,” 509-5, “Parking In Metered Spaces,” and 509-15, “Temporary Closure Fees,” and repealing Section 509-1-P9, “Parking Modernization Agreement,” of Chapter 509, “Parking Meters,” and amending Sections 515-5, “Answer; procedures,” and 515-11, “Parking infraction fines,” of Chapter 515, “Parking Infractions; Collection Procedures,” to remove provisions that were implemented to effectuate the Long-Term Lease and Modernization Agreement, which was terminated by agreement of the parties; to provide that charges for parking of oversized vehicles are the same for single-space and multi-space parking meters; and to revise the fine structure for failure to timely answer parking violation citations.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 58-2013 amended the Municipal Code in order to implement the proposed Long-Term Lease and Modernization Agreement (“the Lease”) for the City of Cincinnati Parking System, which was previously authorized by Ordinance No. 56-2013; and

WHEREAS, prior to issuance of any parking bonds and prior to the occurrence of the closing date for the Lease, the Port of Greater Cincinnati Development Authority and the City agreed to terminate the Lease, and therefore the Municipal Code changes authorized and enacted by Council to implement the Lease are no longer needed; and

WHEREAS, the City’s fine structure for failure to timely answer a parking violation citation now provides that the fine will double if the citation is not answered within seven days, which is a greater penalty than that imposed by other comparable cities in Ohio; and

WHEREAS, Council determines the fines and payment periods provided for in this ordinance are a sufficient deterrent to delaying payment of parking citations without imposing a penalty that could be financially insurmountable in some circumstances; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That existing Section 509-1-P9, “Parking Modernization Agreement,” is hereby repealed.

Section 2. That Sections 509-1, "Parking Meters, Locations," 509-5, "Parking In Metered Spaces," and 509-15, "Temporary Closure Fees," of Chapter 509, "Parking Meters," and Section 515-11, "Parking infraction fines," of Chapter 515, "Parking Infractions; Collection Procedures," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 509-1. - Parking Meters, Locations.

The city manager or person designated by the city manager shall be authorized to provide for the installation, regulation, maintenance, control, operation, and use of parking meters on any street or part of a street, and on all other municipally owned property, where parking is permitted for limited periods only, and parking spaces are ordinarily occupied to capacity, and where the use of such parking meters would tend to reduce over-parking in violation of the ordinances and shall further be authorized to maintain such parking meters in good workable condition.

The city manager or person designated by the city manager shall be authorized to adjust the metered parking fee pursuant to the any parking modernization agreement entered into by the city that requires or provides for metered parking fee adjustments.

Sec. 509-5. - Parking In Metered Spaces.

(a) Spaces controlled by single-space meters. Whenever, during hours of limited parking, any vehicle is parked in any designated space at which there is located a single-space parking meter, the owner, operator, manager or driver of the vehicle shall, upon entering the vehicle in the parking space, immediately pay the required fee by any method accepted by such meter; provided, however, that such owner, operator, manager or driver may use the unexpired time remaining on the meter from its previous use without making an additional payment.

When a vehicle is too large to be confined in a single space, the owner, operator, manager or driver of the vehicle shall make payment for the number of parking spaces the vehicle fully or partially occupies only the meter nearest the hood or front end of said vehicle need be operated.

If a vehicle remains parked in any single-space parking space beyond the limit fixed for the amount of the payment accepted by such meter such vehicle shall be considered as parked overtime.

(b) Spaces controlled by multi-space meters. Whenever, during hours of limited parking, any vehicle is parked in any designated space which is regulated by a multi-space parking meter, the owner, operator, manager or driver of the vehicle shall, upon entering the vehicle in the parking space, immediately pay the required fee by any method accepted by such meter and if so required, the purchased receipt shall be placed face-up and conspicuously displayed inside the vehicle where it can be clearly seen from outside the vehicle; provided, however, that such owner, operator,

manager or driver may use the unexpired time remaining on the meter from its previous use without making an additional payment.

When a vehicle is too large to be confined in a single space, the owner, operator, manager or driver of the vehicle shall make payment for the number of parking spaces the vehicle fully or partially occupies.

If a multi-space parking meter is out of order or unable to accept payment and there are other multi-space parking meters available nearby to accept such payment for that parking space or spaces, payment shall be made to one of the other available meters.

If a vehicle remains parked in any multi-space parking space beyond the expiration time printed on the receipt conspicuously displayed in the vehicle, or shown on the meter, such vehicle shall be considered as parked overtime.

Sec. 509-15. - Temporary Meter Closure Fees.

The city manager or person designated by the city manager may charge a temporary closure fee pursuant to any parking modernization agreement entered into by the city that requires or provides for temporary closure of parking meters fees. Prior to implementation of such a fee, the city manager or his or her designee shall adopt rules and regulations that establish the process for approving requests for temporary parking meter closures and the charges for such closures.

That existing Sections 509-1, "Parking Meters, Locations," 509-5, "Parking In Metered Spaces," and 509-15, "Temporary Closure Fees" of Chapter 509, "Parking Meters," and 515-11, "Parking infraction fines," of Chapter 515, "Parking Infractions; Collection Procedures," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code are hereby repealed.

Section 4. That existing Section 515-5, "Answer; procedures," of Chapter 515, "Parking Infractions; Collection Procedures" is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 515-5. - Answer; procedures.

(a) A person who is personally or constructively served with a parking ticket charging the commission of a parking infraction may answer the charge by appearing personally before the Parking Violations Bureau or by mail. An answer shall be made within seven fourteen days from the date of the infraction, and shall be in one of the following forms:

(1) An admission that the person committed the parking infraction, by payment of any fine arising out of the parking infraction;

(2) An admission that the person committed the parking infraction, with an explanation of the circumstances surrounding the parking infraction;

(3) A denial that the person committed the parking infraction and a request for a hearing relative to the infraction. If the person desires the presence of the law enforcement officer or parking enforcement officer who issued the parking ticket at the hearing, the person must request that presence in the answer.

(b) (1) A person who admits that he committed a parking infraction shall, and a person who admits that he committed a parking infraction with explanation may, when making their answer, pay the fine arising out of the infraction admitted, to the Violations Clerk of the Parking Violations Bureau.

(2) A person who admits that they committed a parking infraction with explanation shall submit evidence to the Parking Violations Bureau that explains the circumstances surrounding the parking infraction. The evidence may be submitted in person

or, to avoid the necessity of personal appearance, may be sent as affidavits and other documentary evidence, by mail. The Parking Violations Bureau, when it receives an answer admitting that a person committed a parking infraction with explanation, shall promptly determine whether the explanation mitigates the fact that the person committed the parking infraction and notify the person in writing of its determination.

If the Parking Violations Bureau determines that the explanation mitigates the fact that the person committed the parking infraction, the Parking Violations Bureau shall eliminate or reduce the amount of the fine arising out of the parking infraction. If the fine is eliminated or reduced and the person has previously paid the fine, the amount paid in excess of the revised fine shall be returned to the person; if the fine is eliminated or reduced and the person has not previously paid the fine, the person shall pay only the amount of the revised fine. If the Parking Violations Bureau determines that the explanation does not mitigate the fact that the person committed the parking infraction, the person owes the entire amount of the fine arising out of the parking infraction, and if the person has not previously paid the fine, the person shall pay the entire amount of the fine. If the person admits that he or she committed a parking infraction with explanation and the person fails to pay the amount of the fine due within ten days after receiving notice of the Parking Violations Bureau's determination, unless the amount due has been previously paid, the Parking Violations Bureau's determination and the amount of the fine due shall be considered a judgment and shall be treated as if it were a judgment rendered subsequent to a hearing held pursuant to Division (b) of

Section 515-7 hereof.

(3) A person who denies that he committed a parking infraction shall be granted a hearing concerning the infraction. The Parking Violations Bureau shall set a date for the hearing and notify the person, in writing, of the date, time, and place of the hearing. The hearing shall be conducted by a hearing officer of the Parking Violations Bureau in accordance with Section 515-7 hereof.

(c)(1) If a person who is personally or constructively served with a parking ticket charging the commission of a parking infraction fails to timely answer the charge, as provided in Division (a) of this Section, the Parking Violations Bureau shall issue the proper notifications of infraction pursuant to Section 515-6 hereof, and proceed according to that Section.

(2) A late fee of \$10 will be added to the initial fine if Failure to answer the charge is not answered within the seven fourteen day period provided by Division (a) of this Section; shall cause the initial fine to double and may result in the imposition of additional penalties or costs.

(3) If a person who is personally or constructively served with a parking ticket charging the commission of a parking infraction fails to answer the charge within twenty-one days, the \$10 late fee shall be removed and the initial fine will double.

(d) The issuance of a parking ticket, the filing of or failure to file an answer by a person personally or constructively served with the ticket, the substance of an answer, the payment of any fine, penalty, fee, and cost, and any other relevant information shall be entered in the records of the Parking Violations Bureau.

Section 5. That existing Section 515-5, "Answer; procedures," of Chapter 515, "Parking Infractions; Collection Procedures," of the Cincinnati Municipal Code is hereby repealed.

Section 6. That Sections 4 and 5 of this Ordinance shall be effective October 1, 2015.

Section 7. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

AUTHORIZING the transfer and return to source, Energy Conservation Improvement Bond Fund 817 the sum of \$310,525 from capital improvement program project account number 980x255x142520, "Facilities: HVAC, Lighting, Generator"; **AUTHORIZING** the transfer and appropriation of the same sum of \$150,000 from Energy Conservation Improvement Bond Fund 817 to existing capital improvement program project account number 980x239x142384, "Street Lighting – Performance Contracting"; and **AUTHORIZING** the transfer and appropriation of the sum of \$7,000 from Energy Conservation Improvement Bond Fund 817 to existing capital improvement program project account no. 980x243x142454, "Convention Center Lighting – Performance Contracting," for the purpose of providing resources due to adjustments in the overall scope of work for these projects.

Section 1. That the sum of \$310,525 existing in the capital improvement program project account number 980x255x142520, “Facilities: HVAC, Lighting, Generator,” is hereby transferred and returned to source, Energy Conservation Improvement Bond Fund 817.

Section 2. That the sum of \$150,000 is hereby transferred and appropriated from the Energy Conservation Improvement Bond Fund 817 to existing capital improvement program project account 980x239x142384, “Street Lighting – Performance Contracting,” for the purpose of upgrading and improving the efficiency of streetlights throughout the City.

Section 3. That the sum of \$7,000 is hereby transferred and appropriated from the Energy Conservation Improvement Bond Fund 817 to existing capital improvement program project account 980x243x142454, “Convention Center Lighting – Performance Contracting,” for the purpose of upgrading and improving the efficiency of lighting at the Duke Energy Center.

ESTABLISHING new capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x152349, “Montgomery Road Safety Improvement Grant,” and new capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x152350, “Ohio River Trail West Grant,” and further AUTHORIZING the City Manager to accept and appropriate a grant of \$2,000,000 from the Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality Program (CFDA # 20.205) awarded by the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments to capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x 152349, “Montgomery Road Safety Improvement Grant,” and a Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality Program grant from the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments in the amount of \$1,045,000 to capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x152350, “Ohio River Trail West Grant.”

WHEREAS, the City Council approved Ordinance No. 0112-2014 on May 29, 2014, which authorized the Administration to apply for Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality Program (“CMAQ”) grants awarded by Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments (“OKI”) for various projects, including the installation of two segments of the Ohio River Trail West; and the rehabilitation of Montgomery Road and implementation of safety measures along Montgomery Road from the Norwood Corporation line to the Silverton Corporation line (“the projects”); and

WHEREAS, the CMAQ program supports two important goals of the U.S. Department of Transportation to improve air quality and relieve congestion, and the projects meet those goals; and

WHEREAS, the CMAQ grant funds will be used to install two segments of the Ohio River Trail West totaling approximately 1.8 miles between Evans Playfield to State Avenue and Fairbanks Avenue to Gilday Riverside Playfield; and to rehabilitate Montgomery Road and implement safety

measures along Montgomery Road from the Norwood Corporation line to the Silverton Corporation line; and

WHEREAS, the grants require local match funding totaling \$761,000 which is available from the following sources: Ohio River Trail 980x233x152322 – \$69,534; Bike Trails 980x233x142353 – \$191,466; and \$500,000 provided by resources available in the FY 2016 appropriation to the Street Rehabilitation program; and

WHEREAS, there are no new FTE requirements associated with these grants; and

WHEREAS, the installation of these Ohio River Trail West segments and the rehabilitation and improvement of City streets are in accordance with the “Connect” goal to “develop an efficient multi-modal transportation system that supports neighborhood livability” as described on pages 129-138 of Plan Cincinnati; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cincinnati, State of Ohio:

Section 1. That the Director of Finance is authorized to establish new capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x152349, “Montgomery Road Safety Improvement Grant,” for the purpose of funding the rehabilitation of Montgomery Road and implementation of safety measures along Montgomery Road from the Norwood Corporation line to the Silverton Corporation line and to establish new capital improvement program project account no. 980x232x152350, “Ohio River Trail West Grant,” for the purpose of funding the installation of two segments of the Ohio River Trail West totaling approximately 1.8 miles between Evans Playfield to State Avenue and Fairbanks Avenue to Gilday Riverside Playfield.

Section 2. That the City Manager is authorized to accept and appropriate a grant of \$2,000,000 from the Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality Program (“CMAQ”) awarded by the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments (“OKI”) to be used for the rehabilitation of Montgomery Road and implementation of safety measures along Montgomery Road from the Norwood Corporation line to the Silverton Corporation line and a

CMAQ grant from OKI in the amount of \$1,045,000 to be used for the installation of two segments of the Ohio River Trail West totaling approximately 1.8 miles between Evans Playfield to State Avenue and Fairbanks Avenue to Gilday Riverside Playfield.

Section 4. That the City Manager is authorized to execute any agreements necessary for the receipt and administration of these grants resources.

EMERGENCY ORDINANCE NO. 188-2015

AUTHORIZING the appropriation to Fund 304, the Community Development Block Grant Fund, the sum of \$3,486,510 for operating expenditure accounts according to the attached Schedule of Appropriation, for the purpose of aligning resources to projected expense needs, which are to be supported by current and anticipated grant resources from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Calendar Years 2015 and 2016 CDBG Programs.

WHEREAS, the City needs to appropriate funds to various Fund 304 operating accounts in order to allow for the continuation of City services; and

WHEREAS, \$3,486,510 is the total amount included in the FY 2016 Operating Budget, which includes the final

WHEREAS, on October 29, 2014 City Council approved Ordinance No. 300-2014 to appropriate Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for projects for Calendar Year 2015, which began January 1, 2015 and ends December 31, 2015; and

Nature of Request:

The applicant and/or owners requested a variance from Section 1421-09(c) – Lot Area for Lots of Record regarding minimum lot sizes, where the Cincinnati Zoning Code (CZC) states that: “The area of the lot is no less than 16,000 square feet” for the construction of houses in an SF-20 zone.

The applicant wishes to construct a single-family home on their vacant lot. The house would be built in accordance with all zoning and dimensional requirements, except that the lot size is 11,804.76 square feet whereas the Zoning Code requires at least a 16,000 square foot lot to construct a house in this zone.

Existing Conditions:

The subject property is located in the Mt. Lookout neighborhood on Grandin Road near the northwest corner of Grandin Road and Stanley Avenue. This area of Mt. Lookout contains single-family residences primarily built in the early to mid-1900's with large lot sizes similar to suburban residential houses, with some houses predating Cincinnati's Zoning Code. The property is not within any overlay district beyond the base zoning of SF-20.

The applicant purchased this property and an adjacent property with an existing single-family home at 653 Stanley Avenue in September of 2014, selling the property at 653 Stanley Avenue in December of 2014 to Barrett and Emily Chapel. A swimming pool currently exists on the property at 3673 Grandin Road and the lot acts as a backyard for the house at 653 Stanley Avenue.

The lot size of the property in question is 11,804.76 square feet, which leaves its only legally allowed use as a community garden. More than a quarter of the homes in this area are built on lots smaller than 16,000 square feet which do not comply with the Code's dimensional requirements. Additionally the two neighboring properties at 653 Stanley Avenue and 3668 Grandin Road have lot sizes smaller than the required 16,000 square feet.

Proposed Conditions:

A new single-family home is proposed to be constructed in the vacant residential lot. The property deed, neighborhood dimensional non-conformance map, and the site plan are included in the report. The home conforms to other zoning and dimensional requirements including averaging the front yard setback with the neighboring properties.

Although the lot size is more than twenty-five percent less than the required minimum lot size in an SF-20 zone, houses have been constructed on lots around the same lot size as the applicant's lot. Furthermore the lack of other viable uses for this property renders it unbuildable should the dimensional variance be denied.

Applicable Zoning Code Sections:

Section 1421-09 Lot Area for Lots of Record

Chapter 1445 Variances, Special Exceptions, and Conditional Uses

Details of Zoning Relief Required:**The applicant is requesting a Dimensional Variance based on the requirements of Section 1421-09 Lot Area for Lots of Record.**

- Section 1421-09(c) indicates that a minimum lot size of 16,000 square feet is required to construct a house in an SF-20 zone.
- The applicant is proposing to construct a house on a lot measured at 11,804.76 square feet.
- Therefore, the applicant requires a Dimensional Variance for the proposed house of 4,195.24 square feet.

Zoning Conclusion:

The house will abut the two properties which also do not meet the minimum lot size for homes in an SF-20 zone. The new house's lot will not be significantly smaller than that of neighboring properties.

The exception being sought is the absolute minimum necessary for the construction of the house on an under-sized lot. Additionally the approval of the Dimensional Variances for the lot is in the public interest under Cincinnati Municipal Code Section 1445-13 – General Standards as it enhances:

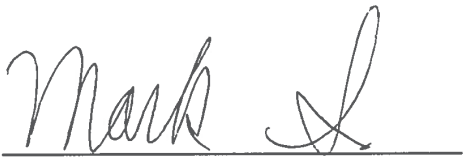
- **H) *Neighborhood Compatibility***, as many other properties in this area have lot sizes of a similar size to the applicant's lot;
- **N) *Tax Valuation***, as the construction of the new house on currently vacant property will increase the value of the property; and

- **O) *Private Benefits***, as the applicant would not have any other economically viable use for the lot if the dimensional variance is denied.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends **APPROVAL of the Dimensional Variance of 4,195.24 square feet for the required minimum lot size** at 3673 Grandin Road.

THE MINUTES OF THE PUBLIC RECREATION COMMISSION

APRIL 21, 2015

The regular meeting of the Public Recreation Commission was held on Tuesday, April 21st, 2015 at the CRC Main Office, 805 Central Ave., Suite 800, Cincinnati, OH 45202 with the following Commissioners present: Messrs. Nelms, MacConnell, Davis and Mme. Denno. Staff in attendance: Mmes., Arszman, Watson, Henderson, Hanks, Haerr, Smith, Finnell, Simmons and Messrs. Gerth, Boyle, Boyer, Wood, Hemmings, Palmer, Heyl, and Jones. President Dawn Denno called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Ms. Denno turned the meeting over to Interim Director Steve Pacella for the election of officers. Mr. Pacella opened the floor to accept nominations for the office of President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission. Mr. Nelms moved to nominate Dawn Denno for the office of President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission for a term of one year and until the election and qualification of his/her successor. Mr. MacConnell seconded the motion.

Motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Pacella asked if there were further nominations for the office of President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission. Mr. Pacella stated that there being no further nominations, the nominations for President were closed. Mr. Pacella announced that Dawn Denno has been elected President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission by acclamation.

Mr. Pacella then opened the floor to accept nominations for the office of Vice-President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission. Dawn Denno moved to nominate Chris Nelms for the office of Vice-President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission for a term of one year and until the election and qualification of his/her successor. Mr. MacConnell seconded the motion.

Motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Pacella asked if there were further nominations for the office of Vice-President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission. Mr. Pacella stated that there being no further nominations, the nominations for Vice-President were closed. Mr. Pacella announced that Chris Nelms has been elected Vice-President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission by acclamation.

Mr. Pacella congratulated Ms. Denno and Mr. Nelms on their re-election as President and Vice-President of the Cincinnati Recreation Commission. Mr. Pacella then turned the meeting back over to President Denno.

President Denno assumed the chair and continued with the meeting.

Ms. Denno stated that it was honor to serve as President for a department that was incredibly valuable to the city. Mr. Nelms also shared his thanks.

At this time Doris Simmons introduced Vanessa Henderson, who is the new SAC at the Bush Recreation Center and Derrick Bearfield, who is a new Laborer for the West Region.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT – Marketing, Design & Communication

Stephanni Cohen, Bunny Arszman and Rick Boyer discussed marketing strategies, media coverage for 2014 and social media presence. Ms. Cohen distributed the Annual Report and discussed billboard placement, the website, surveys, apparel, logo

placement and many other ways that CRC is branding it's image. Ms. Arszman discussed how much CRC was in the news during 2014 and how much it was worth versus purchasing advertising. She also discussed CRC's Facebook page and how much more relevant it has become in recent years. Mr. Boyer discussed Twitter and how we use social media to easily communicate.

Mr. Nelms asked what criterion is used to determine what size the annual report should be. Ms. Cohen answered that they try to condense things that are repetitive. They only print about 300 copies. Mr. Pacella shared an email complimenting Westwood Town Hall staff for making her son's art class so much fun.

Jami Luggen – Thank You from Oyler School

Mr. Pacella shared a letter from Oyler School thanking Council Member Sittenfeld and CRC for their help in removing benches and tables from under the shelter and adding lights in the park on Hatmaker Street.

CHECK PRESENTATIONS

At this time there were two check presentations. The first one was for \$30,000 to the Recreation Foundation from YEP! Fitness and Interact for Health which is part of a grant for a project at the Roselawn Sports Complex. The other one was for \$450.00 from the Mason Old Timers Basket Organization to the Millvale Recreation Center.

TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

Ann James – Hirsch

Ms. James discussed her theater program at Hirsch. She is dyslexic herself and understands how kids can have a difficult time learning. Her program is about self-esteem and she doesn't dumb it down. 13 of her kids have gone on to college. Mr. Davis asked if any of her kids have gone to SCPA. Ms. James said that she has written recommendations for them to go there. Mr. Nelms asked what ages her program is for. Ms. James answered 5-94 years of age.

Tim Palmer – OTR

Mr. Palmer was honored by the 1st Tee Organization of Greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky for his almost 30 years of mentoring children. Mr. Palmer has worked closely with The First Tee-GCNKY since 2005, when he assisted with the pilot program at Avon Fields. He has been bringing children from the CRC OTR Center to participate in the program ever since. Mr. Palmer said that he saw it as doing his job.

Sean Folden – Ladies First program

Ms. Folden volunteers for the Ladies First program at the Evanston Center, which is a 5 week etiquette program designed especially for girls 12-16 years old. The program consisted of two-hour sessions, meeting once a week for four weeks, which included a graduation ceremony. Ms. Folden said that her mother taught her manners when she was young. These girls want to grow up to be doctors and lawyers. Mr. Nelms thanked Ms. Folden for the values that she is providing these young ladies.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Director Position Update

Rob Davis stated that the position for Director is posted and the deadline for applications is May 1st and he is very excited that the process is continuing.

Special Events – March/April

Mr. Pacella discussed the highlights of the May calendar including Dempsey Pool opening on May 23rd.

Photo Montages

Mr. Pacella displayed the photo montages for this month including the Price Hill grand re-opening, the Reds Opening Day Parade, the Spring flooding at CRC facilities and the NEP Ground Breaking at Grant Park. Harry Wood stated that we had lost some games due to flooding, but they expected to be open by the end of the week.

Re-Accreditation Update

Mr. Heyl said that there were 138 standards that needed to be met and we only missed 5 nonessential ones. We came through with flying colors.

Kaboom Playground Update

Mr. Heyl stated 3 communities with playgrounds that are in are on our top 10 list of playgrounds that need to be refurbished – lower Price Hill, Olden in East Price Hill and Chase and Fergus are on Kaboom's list of finalists. Mr. Heyl feels good about our chances. The community build would be scheduled for the middle of July.

Youth Employment Update

Alex Folsom, Youth Commissioner, gave the following update regarding summer youth employment:

- 189 total youth were interviewed
- 61 youth interviewed for the Jr. Counselor position (14 yr. olds)
- 128 youth interviewed for Recreation intern position (15-17 yr. olds)
- 262 youth applied for the Jr. Counselor position
- 389 youth applied for the Recreation Intern position
- 651 total youth applied for the Jr. Counselor and Recreation Intern positions
- We will hire 25 youth for the Jr. Counselor position and 65 youth for the Recreation intern position positions.
- 51% of the youth selected for the program have to meet income guidelines and within the City of Cincinnati limits.

March Financials

Ms. Watson stated that she was there to answer any

questions. We have 3 months left in the fiscal year. Everything is on target. Most of the revenues are coming in for the summer day camps so the 323 Fund looks great. It's above prior year revenues as well year to date. We just have to watch how we forecast it for the year end.

2016 Operating Budget Review

Ms. Watson explained that there was an executive budget review with the budget office and what the Commissioners have in their packets is what they are recommending for fiscal year 2016/2017. In the previous meetings, she mentioned that we were \$27,000 above target because of the health premium and when they front loaded that into the system they increased our target by that amount so they showed us as hitting the target. She had 3 exceptions that she mentioned that were correcting an error from an ongoing exception that was listed as permanent that should have been listed as one time. In the recommendation from the budget office to the City Manager, they recommended correcting the funding source change on the 3, but at this time they did not recommend the exceptions to restore the pool funding. We think that we should be able to still fund them, but this might change as it goes to the City Manager.

Mr. Nelms asked why they did not recommend restoring the pool funding. Ms. Watson answered that it had to do with budget constraints. Ms. Denno asked when the vote on the budget was going to happen. Ms. Watson answered mid-July. Mr. Pacella added that this Council is very pro-Recreation.

YOUTH COMMISSION REPORT

Alex Folsom gave his report as part of the Director's report on Youth Employment.

PLANNING & ENGINEERING

Capital Projects Update

Dan Jones gave the highlights from the Capital Projects Update report.

The highlights include:

- Winton Hills – the skating rink roof replacement is finished.
- McKie gym floor is finished.
- Westwood Town Hall exterior is finished.
- Dempsey – running and filling up.
- Oakley pool – bids are out.

Mr. Nelms asked if we were involved with the All Star Game. Mr. Pacella answered that we were with 3 projects – the Roselawn project, Dyer and Withrow.

Easement addition approval Kennedy Heights Recreation Area

Mr. Jones explained that today there exists an easement across part of the back of the KH Cultural Campus over City Recreation Land. The easement was granted by the city to Krogers and was apparently for a doorway as a secondary means of egress. The easement goes from the door across the building and connects to the parking lot on the KHCC property. Now that we have converted the building into 3 condo units, Unit # 3 needs a new doorway as a second means of egress. Also, the Montessori Center (Unit # 1) wants to install 4 new windows in the back wall to allow light into the classrooms. When the contractor submitted for permits the Building dept. rejected them for two of the windows and the new door noting that the existing easement didn't extend far enough to

the west. They did allow permits for two of the windows because they were located within/next to the existing easement.

Mr. Jones asked the architect what was needed, and she has confirmed that we need to extend the existing easement 40-50 feet west to cover the area where the two other windows and the door will be located. The Building Dept. also said the easement needs to be clarified to confirm that it can be used for ingress/egress and that the city cannot build within it.

The easement is 8 feet wide across the north line of the Recreation property in an area that no one else would ever use.

Mr. MacConnell moved to approve the easement addition for the Kennedy Heights Recreation area. Mr. Davis seconded.

Motion passed unanimously.

Bid Approval – Wayne restroom building

Mr. MacConnell moved to approve the bid for the Wayne restroom building as presented by Dan Jones in the materials provided to the Commission. Materials received for filing. Mr. Davis seconded.

Motion passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

None at this meeting

NEW BUSINESS

Diversity Advisory Council - Internal Transfer Policy & Criteria

The Work Rules & Policies Task Force Committee presented a new Internal Transfer Policy and Criteria before the Commission. Jason Richards, Melissa Haerr and Kim White were on hand to explain the policy. Mr. Richards stated that this policy wasn't to be used as a disciplinary action. Ms. Haerr explained that staff was feeling stagnant in their locations and they wanted an opportunity to grow. Ms. Smith added that everyone feels that this is a fair process. Ms. Haerr said that this will open up communication. Mr. Nelms said that this policy should come back in a year for review. Ms. Denno asked if there was representation from every level. Mr. Richards answered yes. Ms. Denno asked if there was a spelled out time period. Mr. Richards said yes, just like Healthcare enrollment.

Mr. Nelms moved to approve the Internal Transfer Policy & Criteria. Mr. Davis seconded.

Motion passed unanimously.

Price Hill Jazz Fest Beer Sales

Mr. Pacella explained that Price Hill Jazz Fest wanted the Commission's approval to sell beer at their event this summer.

They have all of the proper paperwork and have worked with the police. Mr. Davis moved to approve beer sales for this event. Mr. MacConnell seconded.

Motion passed unanimously.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mr. MacConnell moved that the Commission go into Executive Session pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22 (G) to consider the discipline of a public employee. Mr. Davis seconded.

Roll Call: Mr. MacConnell – Yes; Ms. Denno – Yes; Mr. Davis – Yes; Mr. Nelms – Yes

Ms. Denno advised members in the audience that the Commission would be now be entering into Executive Session and they need to exit the room. They will be called back when the session is over.

The Commission went into Executive Session at 4:30pm.

The Commission came out of Executive Session at 4:46pm.

Ms. Denno invited anyone who wanted to return to the meeting to do so at this time.

Mr. MacConnell moved to approve the recommendation of the Hearing Officer regarding the discipline of Mike Catron. Mr. Davis seconded.
