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## Station X Averages 2400 Calls a Day

The woman sounded almost hysterical as she poured her complaint into the ears of Patrolman Ralph (Skip) Wallace at Station X.

"He's locked himself into his room again," she wept. "My poor little boy. He doesn't know how to open the door. Please, please send the police."

Calmly, Patrolman Wallace pried from the woman her address. Her "boy," she said was 32 and a former mental patient. Without a change in his voice, Patrolman Wallace questioned the woman further and then dispatched a car to the

The call took only 45 seconds, but in that short time Station X operators, including Patrolman Wallace, can learn a lot.

So messages can be properly checked, all emergency calls are recorded on tapes. Each call is noted on a form which is kept in a file at least two years.

"PEOPLE TALK mighty fast sometimes," explained Patrolman Wallace. "We can get most messages. But sometimes, we have to take off the tape recording and play it back to be sure what we heard. Also, if there is a complaint, we have the exact message, in the person's own voice."

The men at Station X learn how to identify a real emergency from a call which may mean only a small family difficulty. It goes on 24 hours a day.

At least 2400 times a day, they lift up a receiver and hear a complaint of minor or great significance. On busy days, such as Fridays, Saturdays and Mondays, they get as many as 2700 calls.
