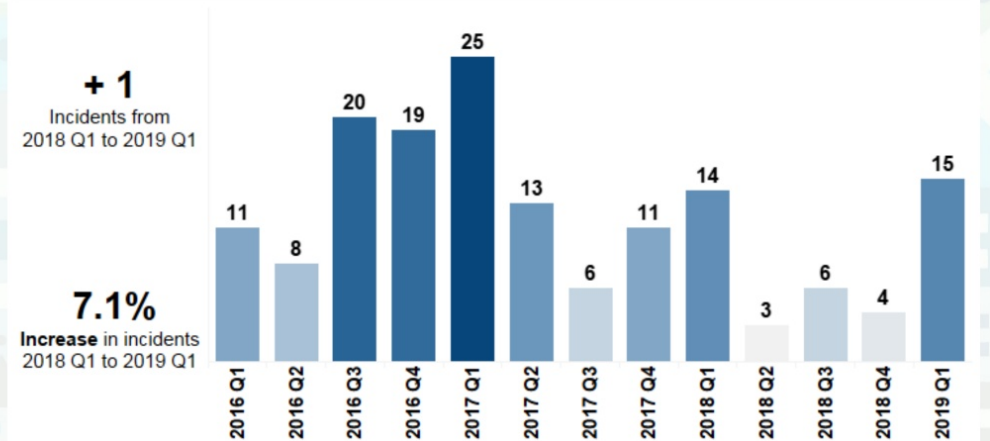

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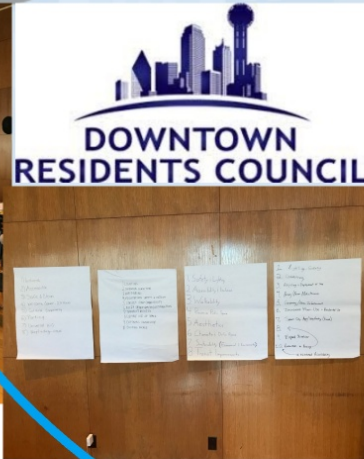

URBAN IMPACT **Designing a lifeline**

University of Cincinnati design team creates a naloxone-dispensing device to help combat the city's opioid crisis

LIKE MANY CITIES across the country, Cincinnati has been rocked by the opioid epidemic, with an ever-fluctuating range of 30-80 overdoses per week across the Tri-State. Many of those victims are revived by the overdose reversal medication naloxone, which has proven to be a crucial lifesaving tool during this crisis.

Claudia Rebolis, graduate studies coordinator in SCC's College of Design, Architecture, Art, and Planning (DAAP), designed a device to make naloxone more accessible to those in need, building on a model she helped create first in Providence, Rhode Island, and now deploying in Cincinnati areas that are most at risk.

The associate professor in DAAP's Mason E. Ullman, Jr. School of Design has worked with graduate students to create AntiDOL, a naloxone-dispensing device installed in semi-public places with for bystanders. Like this issue, Rebolis' national campaign how to help.

This form is in response to a request from City Council to take immediate and long-term steps to improve the behavior at and around Platt Park.

This is a Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) assessment of Platt Park.



Background

Platt park is the City's oldest park on land donated by the Platt brothers in 1817 to be used as a marketplace. In 1886 that donated land was dedicated to park use. It was renovated in 1887 and again in 1915. The most recent major renovation was in 1988. The park is designed primarily as a pleasant walkway between Elm and Vine Street. It has benches and raised beds along the walkway under a tree canopy and a archway through the length of the park. There are statues at the outside ends of the park and fountains at Race Street. This park is a popular location for wedding photographs due to its tree canopy and tree canopy.

The problem

In recent years other parks in the downtown and Over the Rhine area have received major renovations based on CPTED principals making them unsuitable for illegal and disorderly behavior. Recently renovated parks nearby include Washington Park, Ziegler Park, Grant Park, and the recently re-opened Findlay Park.

Platt Park and the surrounding structures have created a desirable location for open air drug sales and the space is perfect location for chronic individuals to gather. At the Vine Street side of the park is a liquor establishment that serves in-person via single serve cans of alcohol and snacks including dice commonly used in street gaming and engaging paper commonly used for marijuana consumption. There is a large vacant building on the north side of Vine Street at the park entrance which fails to provide legitimate activity in the area. The Public Library provides a climate-controlled space and restroom for temporary comfort in inclement weather. The tree canopy provides concealment from the upper levels of the surrounding buildings providing park patrons a feeling of concealment in the park. The high foot traffic and large number of chronic individuals in the park all day who provide cover for drug sales make this location desirable for drug sales and the other crimes that accompany that including gaming, disorderly conduct, and violence.

The park has taken on a party space feeling in the afternoons and evenings. Large numbers of people gather and drink, gamble and sell drugs in the park. The "park crowd" protects their space by heckling and even threatening people who walk in and around the park that are not part of the "park crowd". Businesses and residents report that they do not feel safe in and around the park.

Responses:

1. Repair and improve the lighting in the park.
2. Remove parking spaces used almost exclusively for drug sales near Vine Street.
3. Activate the park by implementing the suggestions made by the 2019 DAAP class including signage, sound system and CPTED App.
4. The Garfield Hotel is in receivership and is being properly secured.
5. Continue to conduct high visibility patrols by Police, ambassadors, and Park staff in the park to curb disorderly and illegal behavior.
6. The Library's Vine Street Entrance renovation begins soon.
7. The convert stores on Vine Street will be closed November 1st.

Lights

The pole lights are complete and fully operational. The arch lights are on order and will be installed upon delivery.



Parking

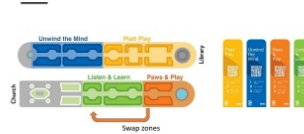
Councilman David Mann committed to having these meters removed ASAP and replaced with no parking signs.



Activate the park

The graduate level DAAP class titled Mediated Urban Environments created a plan to activate the park by creating activity zones which include signage and speakers as well as online interactive exercises for each space. These temporary alterations have been discussed with the Park Board and SCDC and will be implemented in some form when COVID has subsided. The scope is still being debated as well as the funding for the project.

The Garfield

The Garfield is in receivership and is being maintained secure until it can be activated. The front of the building is barricaded due to grave damage. The secondary benefit to this action is that drug sales in this unsupervised space are being abated due to the barricades.



The Library

The Library will be renovating the Vine Street entrance to the library which will impact Platt Park.



Garfield Mini Mart

The Garfield Mini Mart will be closed permanently November 1st.

Background
 Piatt Park is the City's oldest park on land located by the Park Commons in 1817. It has served as a marketplace in 1844, first school site and was dedicated to park use. It was incorporated in 1857 and again in 1915. The most recent change occurred was in 1988. The park is enclosed on three sides by a pleasant roadway between 10th and 11th Streets. This boundary and closed ends are the roadway, which is a barrier and is in keeping with the length of the park. There are setbacks on the outside ends of the park and corners at Race Street. This park is a popular location for wedding photographs due to its architecture and tree canopy.
